Message from the Rabbi

Marking time is a complicated business. The beginning of Mishnah tractate Rosh haShannah lists the four "new years" in the Jewish calendar, each of which designates a different counting. On the first of Nisan, the festival cycle restarts with Passover and the years of the king's reign are counted. On the first of Elul, the tithe of cattle is determined. On the first of Tishrei, calendar, sabbatical, and jubilee years begin and the tithe of ground crops is calculated. And on the first of Shevat, just before Tu biShvat, the tithe of tree crops is set.

The Mishnah goes on to list four moments of judgment during the year. Though these are related to the new years, most happen on different dates. The new years generally mark times of harvest and maturation; on each, a process has completed that can now be quantified and assessed. The moments of judgement take place during gestation phases, the periods of quiet preparation during which results are not yet visible but are nevertheless in formation.

The day we call *Rosh haShannah*, occurring at the beginning of the approaching month of *Tishrei*, appears on both lists. On this New Year, we confront our pasts, the opportunities seized and neglected, calls answered and ignored, work performed and left undone. This reflection plants a seed and influences the course of the year to come. Humanity is unique in that, by coming to terms with our past, we have a hand in determining our future. Unlike the plants and cattle, whose gestation phases are biological and built into the seasons, our time of judgement is tied to our conscious choice to reorient inward, to return to ourselves and to God. Thus, on *Rosh haShannah*, we simultaneously harvest and sow.

This past year has been a time of great change for the Agudat Achim community. As we collectively reflect on CAA's recent experiences, I hope that future striving is balanced with appreciation. My family and I have been struck by the warmth, generosity, and mutual concern of this community as well as the dedication and sustained engagement of so many of its members. These are some of the qualities that drew us here and make us so excited to share in this community's future.

As we enter into a time of gestation and introspection together, I invite you to share with me both your appreciation and aspiration, your reflections on what is already dear to you at CAA as well as what you envision for the road ahead.

Thank you for inviting me to participate in the journey of continuing to nurture this community's roots while growing new shoots and striving for even greater fulfillment of our shared calling.

May we merit future vision as well as deep recognition of the blessings of this community. My blessings to you and your loved ones for a good, healthy, and very sweet new year.
